Whether or not you plan on becoming active within the association, everyone is always welcome!

Who are we and what do we do?

Storm has 17 active committees, which organise all kinds of fun activities. These activities range from parties, sports and (foreign) trips, to excursions and career related activities. Storm has its own room where you can relax before, during, and after classes, located in the Buys Ballotgebouw. During this time you can chill and play games with other Stormers from all different years whilst enjoying free coffee and tea.

ed P ogramme

Here you will find a detailed description of everything we are going to do during the introduction week. Please note: your mentors or somebody from the committee will always have a place for you to sleep if you don't have a room in Utrecht yet. So you don't need to worry about that ;) For some you may be required to bring your own air mattress and sleeping bag if you want to stay the night. You'll also need a bike. If you don't have a bike yet, you can rent an OV-bike or a Swapfiets. We travel to a lot of different places in Utrecht, so it's crucial to have one!

Monday

Your introduction week will start on Monday the 2nd of September. You are expected at Bolognalaan 1.206 between 8:30 and 9:00. The route to this building is explained later on in the booklet. We will start the day with a short introduction of Storm, the study association of Global Sustainability Science, and information about the week. This is followed by a speech of Pieter Louwman, the Study Advisor, who will tell important things regarding your study programme. After a short break, we will continue with a talk from Margien Bootsma, programme leader. Afterwards, you will finally meet the introduction group you have been assigned to. You will meet your mentor moms and dads that guide you and your fellow students through the week! During lunch, you will have time to get to know each other a bit better. After lunch, you will go to the computer rooms to register for the study association as well as the introduction weekend.

At 15:00, you will head to the city centre with your group to play life-size Monopoly! We transformed this popular board game into a real-life version. You will see the most famous locations of Utrecht while trying to win the game! When the game is finished, you will have dinner at your mentor's place with your group, where you can chill, have some drinks and get to know each other even better!

Tuesday

On Tuesday you will start the day with an inspiring talk from our patron Klaas van Egmond, this talk will take place in KBG Atlas. Afterwards, the introduction committee will explain how the rest of the day is scheduled as Tuesday is the day of the Sustainable Introduction Stunt (DIS)! Before heading towards the DIS, you will have an excursion to Food Forestry. This is a project where food is grown in an organic way in a forest. After this excursion, you will finally start the DIS at around 14:00. You are expected to either have made your own lunch beforehand or buy it in the time you have to travel to the location. For the DIS, the group will be split into five parts, as multiple activities have been planned. What you will exactly be doing on this day will be explained in the morning, as it is quite much to explain in a booklet, but it will definitely be entertaining and educative! After the DIS at around 17:00 we will head to

Karel V, where we will festively finish the day by announcing the winners and having some drinks! Afterwards, you will have dinner and pre-drinks with your mentor and group! You have to be at the Poema, a club in Utrecht, around 22:30 at the latest. Then, we will go in with everyone present, and that will be the start of a fun night out in Utrecht! However, we certainly did not forget the first years that are not yet 18 or not want to party, we arranged a few pooling tables at OZEBI pooling in the Nobelstraat. Some of the committee members will be here to assure you have a good time!

Wednesdav

This morning you will start with your very first lecture of the course Sustainability Challenges! You are expected at the university at 10:00h. We already arranged for you that this time the lecture will start one hour later than it usually would, so please make sure to be there on time. The exact lecture hall will be communicated to you later by the university.

After your lecture, Storm organises a chill 'staff-student drinks', where you can meet the university staff and teachers that you will see more often in the coming years of your study. This is an informal setting, so you can ask (almost) anything you would like to know! After these staff-student drinks, we will head to the city centre again for dinner and bowling at Bison Bowling. Here the group will be divided in two: the first group starts with bowling at 18:00h while the other group then starts bowling. After 1.5 hours, the groups switch, so that the first group can have dinner and the second group will enjoy bowling.

After the Bison Bowling, we can enjoy a last drink in the pub we have our Monthly Drinks: Walden.





Thursday

Today you will have your first Mathematics & Systems Analysis lecture. This lecture will introduce you to the course and provides information for you to start your first computer practical on the course. The lecture will be from 9:00 to 11:00, afterwards you will have the computer practical, which is from 11:00 to 13:00. The exact location for this will later be communicated to you by the university. After the obligatory classes, we have arranged a brilliant quiz for you in the lecture hall **KBG Atlas**, and if you do well you may even win a prize! Here there will also be an

opportunity for you to buy lunch. The charity committee of Storm has a tradition called Thursday Treats, at which you can buy yourself lunch and support a charity! After the quiz and lunch, you are free to go home, you have a wonderful weekend to prepare for!


the groups will be finished and will do the other activity. In the afternoon you will get to know the committees of Storm, can ask all your questions, and also subscribe for one if you want!

There are so many and I feel like Utrecht has a lot to offer, so do not be afraid to step out of your comfort zone every once in a while, because it has given me some of my best memories.


When should you avoid me during the introduction week?



Our Patron: Klaas van Egmond

Storm, the study association for **Environmental Sciences in** Utrecht, is an essential part of a university based education, where young people are to become both scientists and balanced adults who can face the massive problems the world will have to solve during the coming decennia. In entering this so called 'Anthropocene', the face of the physical earth for the first time in human history, is determined by the human, social system, rather than the other way round. The Dutch comedian Freek de Jonge once said that the problem of our nowadays world is 'that everybody zooms in, and nobody zooms out'. Students in environmental and sustainability sciences just have to do both. Apart from the in-depth study on relevant specific subjects and the application of scientific methods, they in particular have to be able to understand the very complex interrelations, within the physical (eco)system, within the social system and between both. In this process, it is especially important for environmental scientist to be able to combine knowledge from different disciplines. Combining knowledge is a skill on its own. As always, students need to learn to specialize, but increasingly they also need to learn to receive and process

specialized information from others.

Storm plays an important role for that last aspect. It does so by organizing meetings and congresses related to the environment and sustainability and by creating more general educational activities that place the different disciplines in a broader context. Storm organizes a yearly career symposium in collaboration with different enterprises. Here students can orientate on their career after their time at the university. They also engage the parents of our students in their work and in their living environment by organizing the yearly parent day. At the same time, the association stands up for the interests of the students with respect to the university, especially regarding the quality of our university courses. The members of the board keep a friendly and where necessary formal contact with the professors and staff. Beside this, the association also has a very important social function; she enables the individual student to acquire the necessary social network within the university community. The highest building of the city is the tower of the Dom Cathedral. With its 112,32, meters in height The Dom is a symbolic landmark and one of the most touristic places of Utrecht. The citizens are so attached to the sacred tower, it is not allowed to build buildings that are higher than The Dom in the city centre. Wilhelmina Park

One of the best spots in Utrecht to relax on sunny days. The Wilhelmina Park is located on the way downtown from The Uithof. The park offers greens to play ball or to keep up your tan. Bring some drinks and enjoy the sun! The Uithof

Here, you can find the biggest concentration of knowledge in the Netherlands. The Uithof is the name of the science park in East Utrecht. Most of your classes during your academic time are given somewhere on The Uithof. It is a place for learning but also a spot for socializing.

Nightlife

Utrecht's nightlife has something to offer to every type of person on almost every night of the week. All bars and clubs are at walking distance on Neude, Janskerkhof, Nobelstraat and many other places. Storm also organizes great parties and once a month there is a drink for all its members. On Thursdays, the Tivoli Vredenburg is the place to be! During the weekends all the clubs and bars are open for some drinks and your best dance moves. Also, make sure you join the crazy student house parties all over the city! Of course, you can (and should) also ask you intro parents for the best places to go, since they have experienced it all!





Studying at the UU

New to studying? Here are some tips. This info should get you on the right track.

Blackboard, Osiris and other platforms

The first one sounds like a thriller series and the second one is an ancient Egyptian God. However these two platforms will provide vital information for any student at UU. If you had an online platform on your high school (for Dutch students; magister, Som, itslearning etc.), it is probably comparable to Blackboard. You can also find an app in the appstore for Blackboard.

Blackboard will be your primary source of communication from your teachers. Here you will find all the things you need, hand in your assignments, and, most importantly, find your course manual. As an older student to an inexperienced one: "READ YOUR COURSE MANUAL!". This provides all the useful information you can wish for at the start of a semester. Second to this, there is Osiris. This platform provides information about the courses, and enables you to subscribe to them. Make sure to keep an eye on the subscription dates to make sure you can follow courses. Do not worry about the first period, the university already arranged that for you! Other platforms useful for your time as a student are the MyUU app and your gmail account. Every student has a gmail account which can be helpful to get in touch with each other and teachers. The MyUU app shows your student card, study progression and timetable for courses.

Important buildings

There are many buildings on the science park, and in the beginning, it will probably feel a bit like a maze. But luckily you don't have to be in all buildings, in the first year it is mainly the Ruppert building, Educatorium, Minnaert, KBG and BBG. The nice thing about the science park is that many buildings are connected to each other and you can therefore quickly move from one building to another. To get to the science park quickly, you can come by bike or take the bus/tram. If you take bus 12 / tram 22, you can get off at Padualaan for KBG and BBG and for Ruppert and Educatorium you get off at Heidelberglaan. On the map below you can clearly see where everything is. If it is not completely clear for you yet, do not worry. During the intro week your mentor parents will give you a tour so that you can find everything quickly. For the map of the Science park, scan the QR code.

Nice places to study

Unfortunately, being a student is not just fun, sometimes you will have to learn for an exam or do an assignment. The university has many great places for you to study in a good environment. We have the UB (the university library), here you can find a seat in the 'free area', but you can also reserve rooms here to work on a project with multiple people. Book these in advance, otherwise they will probably be occupied! KBG also has many nice study areas: there are places on the second floor where it is hushed, on the ground floor and the first floor there are long tables which you can sit at, there are also group rooms and study booths here. In BBG and Minnaert there are different types of study rooms as well, so all in all, there is more than enough, and you will soon find out what you think is the best place to study ;)

Where to chill and get your foodies

The one and only supermarket on the whole Science Park is the Spar. Close to the Spar you can find the pizzeria Tricolore, Utrecht's famous "Broodje Ben" and also restaurant The Basket is very close by. Furthermore you can have a nice coffee in Jazzman's, beneath the Minnaert building. But most of us get our food it the cantines at The Science Park, nearly every building has one. The Science Park can provide most kinds of food, but for a cozy or nice restaurant you will need to go to the city center. Luckily there are more than enough nice places in Utrecht, so finding your perfect place for a coffee or a meal should not be too hard.

To chill, we recommend the botanical gardens. It is a place to relax, enjoy your surroundings and take a break from being inside studying, and it's free for students! It is located at the Science Park in front of the buildings you will often find yourself.





How to get a Bike?

Swapfiets

If you do not have a bike yet and would want to rent one for a longer period of time, an option would be the Swapfiets where you can rent a bike for a decent price. You can rent a normal bike with a student discount for \in 12 per month and for a deluxe bike you will pay \in 19 per month. You will have to show your student card, which you can see in the MyUU app. The bike is trustworthy and reliable, and the advantage is that whenever the bike is in need of reparation or gets stolen you will receive a (new) working bike within 12 hours.

Some notes regarding Swapfiets:

- -The rental is monthly terminable
- -The bike has a theft insurance
- -The reparation costs are free
- -They are available between 08:00 and 22:00

OV Bike

For the whole introduction week, it's really important that you have access to a bike. If you don't have a bike, you can rent an OV bike from the NS. You can get these at the station or in the bicycle shed next to the Library of the Science Park. Be sure to have a personal OV-chipcard registered for OV-bike rental.

STEP 1: A personal OV-card

In order to register for the OV-bike rental you need a *personal* OV-card, which can also be used for all public transport in the Netherlands. A *personal* OV-card just means that the card directly correlates to you, with your name at the back.

It will take a few days before your personal OV-card will be sent to you, so make sure you have the card before the introduction week.

STEP 2: Register for OV-bike rental

To rent an OV-bike, you need to have a season ticket. By visiting the site <u>http://www.ns.nl/en/door-to-door/ov-fiets</u> you can easily arrange this season ticket online, and link it to your personal OV-card. Just follow the directions on the site. After this, you will be able to rent an OV-bike within 30 minutes.

Renting the bike

Using the OV-bike costs €3,85 per 24 hour period. If you keep the OV-bike for longer, then you are charged for additional rental periods (up to a maximum of 72 hours). For time exceeding 72 hours you pay a 5 euro surcharge per 24 hours. Furthermore, if you return your OV-bike to a different location than where you rented it, you will be charged a 10 euro fee. So make sure you return your bike on time and on the same location where you rented it.



•Do either the intro week or weekend cost any money?

Unfortunately, yes. To ensure we deliver you the best possible week of your life, a small contribution is necessary. For the week, this will be $\in 25$,-. Since the week is obligatory, this contribution is also obligatory. The weekend will amount to $\in 35$,-. Though the weekend is not mandatory, we strongly recommend you to come, because you will have an amazing time and make friends for the rest of your life! On Monday you can register for the introduction week.

•What if I don't have a place to stay in Utrecht throughout the week?

Don't worry. You can always stay at one of your mentor parents' place. But make sure that you inform the committee and your mentor parents on the first day of the introduction week.

•What if I have food allergies or specific diet requirements?

Don't worry! All meals prepared at all Storm activities are 100% vegetarian, with vegan options. Besides that, you will need to fill in an information form when you arrive in your introduction group, in which you can clarify any possible food allergies.

•How can I find a room?


