Our Patron: Klaas van Egmond

The year 2020 is not an easy one, neither for the world as a whole, nor for students who intended to continue their education at the university. The global Coronavirus pandemic has brought society near to a standstill. It already complicated high school exams and forced university teachings to move from classroom lectures to the digital environment of video conferencing. Although a certain level of economic activity and scientific education can be maintained in that way, it implies a significant loss in terms of social interaction. Apart from the direct contact between university teachers and students, this is especially relevant for the mutual social contact between the students. In the critical phase of becoming adults, they have to learn as much outside as inside the classrooms. With respect to the first, the study association for Environmental Sciences in Utrecht (Storm) already plays an important role under normal conditions. But under the current conditions which challenge social cohesion, also among students, this role will become even more important.



Notwithstanding these dramatic circumstances, the Corona crisis on the other hand is an interesting phenomenon from a scientific perspective, especially in the field of environmental sciences and sustainability issues. Although the discussion about the origin of the virus is still going on, the 'global change' which it brings about in terms of health effects, economic and social disruption already for a long time is the very research object of these sciences. Herein the patterns of interaction between society, economy and the earth's ecological system are studied. Now societal and economic activity has become dominant over the natural ecosystem and the face of the earth is shaped more by human nature (antropos) than by nature, we are entering the new geological era of the 'Anthropocene'. Herein the general notion is that we gradually surpassed the earth's carrying capacity and as a consequence now are facing the limits to further physical growth. Apart from many questions about the physical system, such as climate change, students also have to understand the social, demographic and psychological backgrounds which brought about the current critical situation. Students have to learn to handle these type of interdependent questions about the social and ecological system as a whole and at the same time must have the ability to look into, and understand the details of the underlying processes. As such the study of environmental sciences and sustainability is a very demanding one.

But the study association Storm comes to the rescue. Complementary to the university teachings they create educational activities that place the different disciplines and fields of research in a broader context. Storm for example organizes excursions, conferences, debates and a yearly career symposium in collaboration with different enterprises. Here students can orientate on their career after their time at the university. They also engage the parents of our students in their work and in their living environment by organizing the yearly parent day. At the same time the organization stands up for the interest of students with respect to the quality of our university courses. The members of the Storm board keep a friendly and where necessary formal contact with professors and staff. But beside this and most important, the student association has an effective social function; she enables the individual student to acquire the necessary social network within the university community. And under the current, extraordinary situation, this gains even more importance.

These are just a few examples of the many sustainability challenges that you have decided to devote your (professional) life to. We will meet each other regularly during your participation in the Global Sustainability Science programme. First of all, in the introductory course Sustainability Challenges we will explore the main causes of sustainability challenges and their solutions. Personally, I have been involved in teaching introductory courses in environmental and sustainability sciences quite some time now, and I am happy with this course that will introduce you to the field of sustainability science as well as several important academic skills. Second, as the programme leader, you can always approach me with questions about or remarks on the programme

The current coronavirus pandemic is expected to have a lasting effect on our way of living, and also on your life as a student - like you've already experienced in the past half year. As a university, we are going through a steep learning curve in offering online, blended and at distance education next to 'normal' educational activities on campus. Studying at UU

New to studying? Here are some tips. This info should get you on the right track.

GSS and Courses:

As you might know, Global Sustainability Science is Utrecht's bachelor study for environmental sciences. This means that you will follow courses that relate to the environment. Therefore, GSS belongs to the Faculty of Geosciences. However, it's not only mandatory environmental courses! GGS offers three types of courses that can be filled up in many different ways. There are (1) mandatory courses every GSSer has to follow, (2) courses that are required for one of the four major tracks within the studies, and (3) free electives.

1. Mandatory courses are courses that provide knowledge that every student needs irrespective of their track choice.
2. The tracks you can follow are "Water, Climate & Ecosystems," "Energy & Resources," "Governance & Societal Transformation," and "Business & Innovation." Each track has an array of courses of which six courses have to be followed to complete the track (certain tracks have overlapping courses).
3. The free elective space grants you the opportunity to choose whatever you are interested in. Would you like to learn Spanish? Sure, follow a course Español. Want to learn how to program? Want to do History or Economics? You are more than welcome at other faculties to join them. Most students use these free electives to subscribe to a minor. Another possibility for this space is to follow two tracks if you are not sure about choosing one.

Blackboard, Osiris and other platforms

The first one sounds like a thriller series and the second one is an ancient Egyptian God. However, these two platforms will provide vital information for any student at UU. If you had an online platform in your high school (for Dutch students; Magister, Som, Itslearning etc.), it is probably comparable to Blackboard. You can also find an app in the appstore for Blackboard. Blackboard will be your primary source of communication from your teachers. Here you will find all the things you need, hand in your assignments, and, most importantly, find your course manual. As an older student to an inexperienced one: "READ YOUR COURSE MANUAL!". This provides all the useful information you can wish for at the start of a semester.

In addition to this there is Osiris. This platform provides information about the courses, and enables you to subscribe to them. Make sure to keep an eye on the subscription dates to make sure you can follow courses. Do not worry about the first period, the university already arranged that for you!

Other platforms useful for your time as a student are the MyUU app that shows your student card, study progression and timetable for courses, and your student gmail account. Every student gets a gmail account which can be helpful to get in touch with other students and teachers. Besides, you will also be notified about announcements from your courses or the university on your gmail account.

Important buildings

There are many buildings on the science park, and in the beginning, it will probably feel a bit like a maze. But luckily you don't have to be in all buildings, in the first year it is mainly the Ruppert building, Educatorium, KBG and BBG, Minnaert. The nice thing about the science park is that many buildings are connected to each other and you can therefore quickly move from one building to another. To get to the science park quickly, you can come by bike or take the bus/tram. If you come by bus/tram you can get off at Padualaan for KBG, BBG and Minnaert, and for Ruppert and Educatorium you get off at Heidelberglaan. On the map below (p. 38) you can clearly see where everything is. If it is not completely clear for you yet, do not worry. During the intro week your mentor parents will give you a tour so that you can find everything quickly.

Nice places to study

Unfortunately, being a student is not just fun. Often you will have to learn for an exam or make an assignment. The university has many great places for you to study in a good environment. There is the UB (the university library) where you can find a seat in the 'free area', but you can also reserve rooms here to work on a project with multiple people. Book these in advance, otherwise they will probably be occupied! Most of the other buildings at the USP, such as KBG, BBG and Minnaert do also have many nice study areas. These include not only places to study on your own, but also group rooms and study booths. So all in all, there are more than enough options and you will soon find out what your best place to study is ;).

Where to have a break and get your foodies

The one and only supermarket on the whole Science Park is the Spar. Close to the Spar you can find the pizzeria Tricolore, Utrecht's famous "Broodje Ben" and also restaurant The Basket is very closeby. Furthermore, you can have a nice coffee in Jazzman's, beneath the Minnaert building. But most of us get our food in the canteens at The Science Park, nearly every building has one. The Science Park can provide most kinds of food, but for a cozy or nice restaurant you will need to go to the city center. Luckily there are more than enough nice places in Utrecht, so finding your perfect place for a coffee or a meal should not be too hard. To have a break, we recommend the botanical gardens. It is a place to relax, enjoy your surroundings and take a break from studying inside, and it's free for students! It is located at the Science Park in front of the buildings in which you will often find yourself.



How to get a bike

OV-bike

For the whole introduction week, it's really important that you have access to a bike. If you don't have a bike, you can rent an OV bike from the NS. You can rent an OV-bike from various locations: it's available at the station, but also in the bicycle shed next to the Library of the Uithof. To rent an OV-bike, you need a personal OV-chipcard and you need to register for OV-bike rental.

STEP 1 (A personal OV-card):

In order to register for the OV-bike rental you need a personal OV-card. A personal OV-card just means that the card directly correlates to you, whereas an anonymous OV-card can be used by anyone (but you cannot rent a bike with an anonymous card). You can use the OV-card to use public transport in the Netherlands. Therefore, a personal OV-card is really useful when you live here. An OV-card costs €7,50 once, after that, you have to top up the balance on your card to travel with it, or to rent a bike. It will take a few days before your personal OV-card will be sent to you, so make sure you have the card before the introduction week if you want to rent an OV-bike.

STEP 2 (Register for OV-bike rental):

To rent an OV-bike, you need to have a season ticket. By visiting the site <http://www.ns.nl/en/door-to-door/ov-fiets> you can easily arrange this season ticket online, and link it to your personal OV-card. The NS charges €0,01 a year in order to verify your personal and payment details. Just follow the directions on the site. Unfortunately, not everything is explained in English, so maybe you should ask a Dutch person to assist you. Once this is done it will be possible to rent an OV-bike within 30 minutes.

STEP 3 (Renting the bike):

Using the OV-bike costs €3,84 per 24 hour period. If you keep the OV-bike for longer, then you are charged for additional rental periods (up to a maximum of 72 hours). For time exceeding 72 hours you pay a €5,- surcharge per 24 hours. Furthermore, if you return your OV-bike to a different location than where you rented it, you will be charged a €10,- fee. So make sure you return your bike on time and at the same location where you rented it. There are a lot of locations near the station where you can rent an OV-bike. For more locations visit <http://www.ov-fiets.nl/huurlocaties>.

Swapfiets

If you do not have a bike yet and want to rent one for a longer period of time, an option would be the Swapfiets. The Swapfiets is a company that rents normal bikes for €13,50 per month with a student discount (€15,00 without student discount). To get the discount you need to show your student card which you can find in the MyUU app. For a deluxe bike you will need to pay €19,50 euros per month. The bike is trustworthy and reliable and the advantage is that whenever the bike is in need of a repair or gets stolen you get a (new) working bike within 12 hours at your chosen location. This saves time and money!

Some notes regarding Swapfiets:

- The rental is terminable on a monthly basis.
- The bike has a theft insurance with €40,- deductible excess.
- The reparation costs are free.
- They are available between 08:00 and 22:00.

So, If you do not want to pay for an OV-bike but do need a cheap, long-term other option, the Swapfiets is definitely recommended. You can sign up at <https://swapfiets.nl/en/offer/utrecht> and find more information on the site or visit them at their shop close to Neude!

Groentetas is an initiative that provides weekly bags full of locally produced vegetables and fruits that are seasonally grown. For only 6 euros per week you can get this weekly "vegetable bag" and you can order and pick

up your groentetas in the Educatorium canteen every Monday between 11.00h and 14.00h. You should order your groentetas a week in advance, so while picking up your bag you can order the following week's bag. It's also possible to order the groentetas online. The groentetas is a great place to get all your locally grown, sustainable vegetables. It could even be the case that you discover vegetables you have never tried before or of which you didn't even know the existence of. If you like cooking it is a great way to get inspiration for new recipes. At the groentetas you always pay in advance so they order the right amount of bags, thus reducing food waste. FAQ

- **Does the intro week cost any money?**

Unfortunately, yes. To ensure we deliver you the best possible week of your life, a small contribution is necessary. For the week, this will be €10,-. Since the week is obligatory, this contribution is also obligatory.

- **What if I don't have a place to stay in Utrecht throughout the week?**

Normally you can always stay at one of your mentor parents' places. However, due to Corona this is not allowed this year. The week has been planned in such a way that there is enough time to travel from and to your parents.

- **What if I don't have a bike?**

It is highly recommended that you have a bike with you throughout the entire week. This is because we will often move from place to place throughout several activities. If you don't have your own bike in Utrecht, you can always rent a cheap OV bike or through a 'swapfiets'. (which is explained on the page "How to get a bike").

- **What if I have food allergies or specific diet requirements?**

Don't worry! All meals prepared at all Storm activities are 100% vegetarian, with vegan options included.

- **What if I suddenly fall ill during the week and cannot continue the Introduction Week activities anymore?**

Let one of your mentor parents or one of the Introduction Committee members know the day before. If you will miss one of the lectures or working groups from your university courses, you can look up the course manual on Blackboard (explained on page 33) to read what to do. Also, if you have corona symptoms, obviously stay at home.

- **Where can I find the schedule of my courses?**

You can download the free Utrecht University app (MyUU) where you can find the schedule of your courses. Will be available a few weeks before the course starts.

- **How can I find a room?**


